Conception

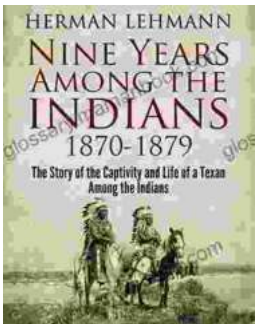
