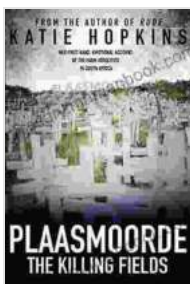

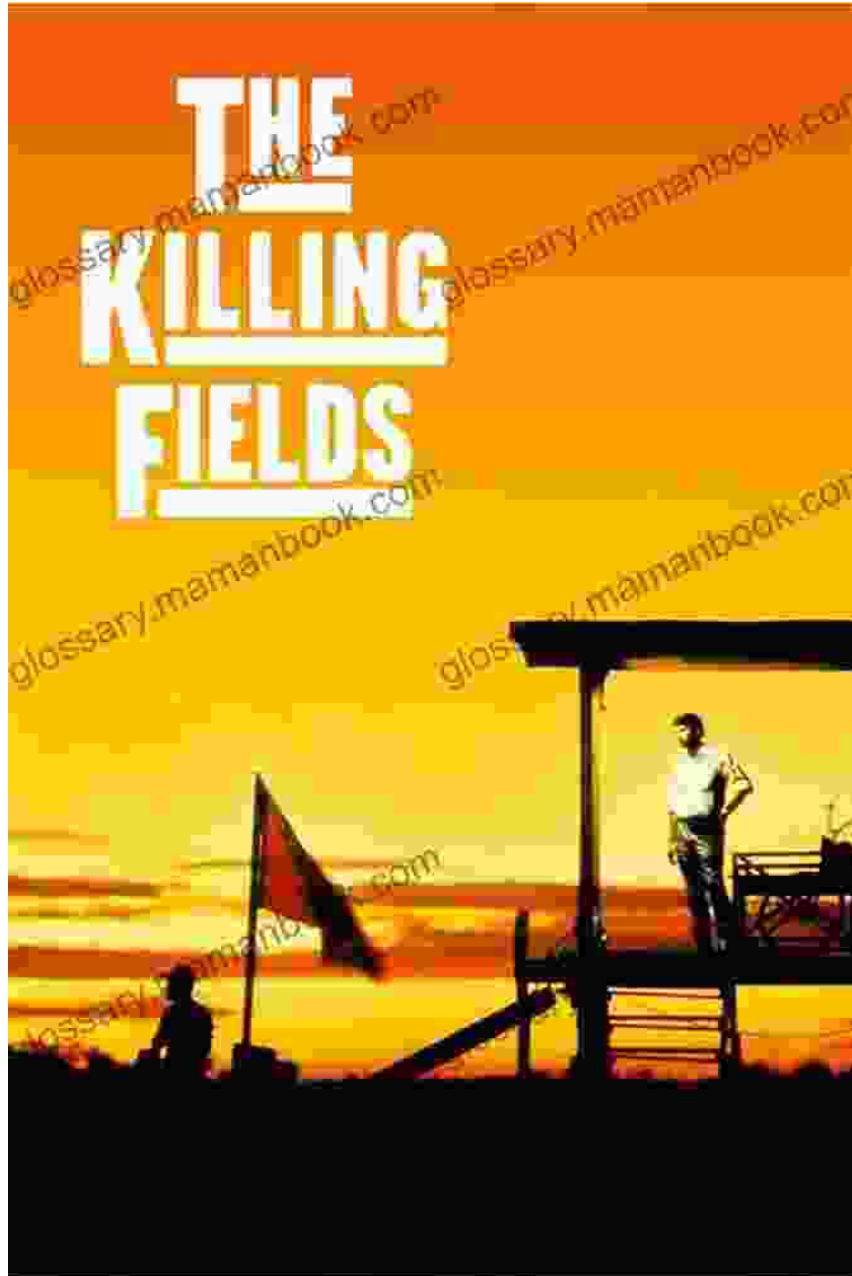


Image: Therese Quinn's book, *Plaasmoorde: The Killing Fields*, investigates the horrific farm murders in South Africa.

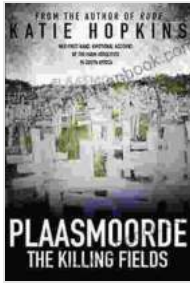

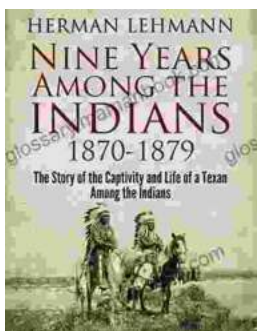
